

January 12, 2025 Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

To my Family of Sacred Heart (St. Paul) and St. Joseph/BOL Parishes,

THE GATES OF SALVATION: The Catechism of the Catholic Church offers us a profound understanding of the sacrament of Baptism: "Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit, and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission: Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration through water in the word' (CCC 1213)." Wow! Clearly, Baptism is much more than a cultural ritual or a simple bathing with water. Baptism unites us with Christ and throws open the gates of entrance to the Church. Baptism is a portal to salvation. Jesus, though free from sin and in no need of baptism, entered the waters to make them holy. He opened the way so that we could follow. Thank you, Jesus!

BOUNTIFUL BEAUTY: "Beauty will save the world," wrote Fyodor Dostoyevsky. Indeed, beauty readily leads us to God. Are we attuned to beauty, though? In our rapid-paced and frenetic culture, we can easily miss the beauty that is all around us. On New Year's Eve, as a good number of us, gathered in the Sacred Heart sanctuary, worshipped before our Lord in the monstrance, there was a palpable sense of beauty. The sanctuary was darkened and still, candles flickered their light into the darkness, and the beauty could be felt. On the feast of the Epiphany, with the fresh fallen snow gently resting on barren branches, there was beauty in the trees. In the smile of a friend there is beauty. In the melody of a familiar tune, there is beauty. Please, be attuned to beauty. God is with us.

A TIME OF JUBILEE: Years of jubilee are found in both the history of Israel and in the history of the Catholic Church. This year, the Year of Our Lord 2025, is again a time of jubilee. **Hope** is the theme of this year's jubilee. Pope Francis has called us to "fan the flame of hope that has been given us." Bishop Persico, aware of the challenges that pastoral planning and parish reconfigurations have presented (we certainly know this from our own experience), is asking us to unite in hope. The bishop wants us to renew our sense of mission. I embrace this call, too. Here in our parishes, we are blessed in so many ways. We have great reason for hope! Are we perfect? No. Are there aspects of parish life that can improve? Absolutely. But this side of Paradise, no parish will ever be perfect. Hope is a confidence that God keeps his promises. Please, embrace that hope in this jubilee year. As we move forward together, we can do so with excitement!

THE BLESSINGS OF RETREAT: Thank you for praying for me as I was on retreat this past week. Your prayers are powerful! Please know that you too were daily remembered in my prayers. God is good, and my time away, spent with Christ, has given me refreshed zeal. Blessings on you all as we end the Christmas season today, and move into ordinary time tomorrow. Jesus, we trust in you!

Due the upcoming change in administration, the US Catholic Conference of Bishops (USCCB) is processing as many applications as possible. Kinship assisted Catholic Charities with 18 new families in December totaling 98 men, women, and children. 3 new families are already on the January arrival schedule. We have never dealt with this many arrivals in 1 month. We are asking you to help us address the following needs: Feminine Pads, Hand Soap-both bars and small bottles, Brooms and Dust pans, Cookie Sheets, Graters, Cutting Boards, Hair Brushes, Bath Mats, Bathroom Rugs, Dish Rags, Mixing and Serving Bowls, Silverware Dividers. and especially Oven-Proof Bakeware. A bin marked for Kinship is located under the Holy Family statue at SH, in the right-side entrance at SJ/BOL, and in the entrance at SP. Thank you.

Feeding the Hungry

Deacon Dabblings

A TALE OF TWO FUNERALS


It was the best of times; it was the worst of times. This was the opening sentence to one of the most well-known novels in the genre of historical fiction, written by English author, Charles Dickens and published in 1859. "A Tale of Two Cities" is a story that offers the reader several important lessons. Among those lessons was one that brought out the complexity of human nature. The contradiction in the title introduces us to this complexity as the story emphasizes the simultaneous reality of lives lived with few or no obstacles compared to those lives that face obstacles throughout. However, this article is not about Charles Dickens or his historic novel, but rather about the complexity of human nature that was evidenced in two recent funerals. They were both parlor services (Funeral prayers and committal done at the funeral home instead of a church). One funeral was for a 96-year-old gentleman and the other was for a 17-year-old child.

I got to know "Uncle" Frank (not really my uncle) many years ago when I was asked by his nephew if I would be willing to bring him Eucharist on weekends and of course, I was happy to do it. "Uncle" was very spiritual and would always ask me to bring Holy Water for him to use. He must have been bathing in it because over the years, I must have brought a reservoir full of water to him. He was in pretty good health for a 96-year-old, but his eyesight was poor, and he was not able to get out without someone taking him. He lived alone but was well taken care of by his family. He was "Old World" spiritual and what I mean by that is he had more statues and candles in his house than we have at St. Paul. "Uncle" died rather unexpectedly because of a fall, but the family and I are convinced that he was ready, and that God welcomed him with open arms. Although there was some sadness at the service, it was indeed a celebration of a long full life.

During "Uncle's" funeral, another parlor service was taking place on the other side of town. It was for a 17-year-old boy who had no health issues yet was deprived of living a long full life because of a rampant plague of teenage violence that has infiltrated society, further emphasizing the complexity of human nature where obstacles play a big part in a person's fate. The gathering at the young man's funeral was as you would expect, very sad. Many people that attended were close to the age of the deceased and their reactions reflected the fact that for most of them, this was the first time that they had ever been in a funeral parlor let alone that they were there for one of their friends. Young people should be gathering at someone's house or at a playground or gym, not at a funeral home saying goodbye to one of their friends. You must wonder what is going through their minds. Do they understand the finality of the situation? Will this make a difference in how they live their lives, in the kind of choices that they make in the future? I don't have an answer for that, but statistics tell us that nothing much will change.

So, as we ponder these two scenarios, pray to God in thanksgiving for "Uncle" Frank's life and pray for all involved in this tragic event, the victim, the perpetrators, and the families of these boys. Also pray to the Holy Family to strengthen family values that will keep families together so that children will have a stable blueprint to follow as they grow through these most difficult years in their life.
